We are thrilled to share our Head Start Annual Report with you!

As you will see, the past year has seen a significant increase in the number of children and families we serve, exciting facility expansions and upgrades, and a growing staff of dedicated, highly qualified teachers, coaches, specialists, advocates, and leaders.

We are proud to share the news that we won our new five and a half-year \$19 million grant from Federal Head Start! This will enable us to continue serving our communities into the future.

- We are particularly excited to welcome new teachers and coaches throughout our program, and experts in mental health and disabilities, nutrition, and health.
- New partnership classrooms with the Brunswick Public Schools opened in 2023-24, and we look forward to collaborating with the Dresden and Wiscasset public schools during the 2024-2025 school year;

- New playgrounds were installed in our Bath, Brunswick, Salt Bay, and Waldoboro centers.

- Physical Development, including Health

Midcoast Maine Community Action's Head Start and Early Head Start program serves children ages 0-5 in center-based, home-based and school-based options throughout the Lincoln, Sagadahoc, and Northern Cumberland communities.





## **HEAD START**

Head Start is a comprehensive, full-day program that strives to create environments that develop cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development in children aged three to five. Understanding the importance of the whole child, Head Start emphasizes health, nutrition, and parent engagement as critical in the educational, socialemotional, and cognitive development of children. The overarching goal is to increase school readiness and social competence in young children from low-income families. Participating in a diversity of educational and social activities, our PreK for ME and Second Step Social Emotional Learning curriculums reflect best practices. The ranges of Head Start services are responsive and appropriate for each child's and family's development, cultural heritage, experience and needs.

## EARLY HEAD START

Early Head Start, providing full-day services for children aged 0-3 years, provides continuous, comprehensive, and high-quality services to underserved infants, toddlers, and pregnant women in center-based and home-based care. Teachers and home visitors are highly trained in child development and education and receive ongoing professional development. Our Creative Curricula focuses on supporting all facets of early childhood development.





## **SUPPORT SERVICES**

In additional to early education and care, children and their families have access to a multitude of support services, including referrals to medical and social services and early intervention services for those children who have been identified as having additional needs, parent education, as well as WIC, Families Can!, LiHeap, Economic Stability, and other needed supports. Each child is given dental, vision, hearing and developmental screenings multiple times throughout the year.



With input from parents, teachers, and the Desired Results Development Profile (a formative assessment designed for teachers to observe, document and reflect on the growth of their students), we collect data and form goals for each student. We also use the data to review program-wide goals and to determine if we need to revise our school readiness goals or approach, to enhance our program development, and to plan staff development.

As children transition to kindergarten, we work closely with the receiving classroom teachers and administration to ensure a smooth beginning. Our supports for parents include parent-teacher conferences, home visits for those who welcome this, transition and information meetings with the kindergarten teams, reading materials for parents about what to expect in the transitions, and information packets about the kindergarten program if needed.
